21st SUNDAY YEAR OF ST MATTHEW AUGUST 23rd 2020

What has come to be known as Peter's confession marks a turning point in the gospel narrative. Caesarea Philippi is as far north as Matthew shows



Jesus' ministry to have extended and from now on he moves south, towards Jerusalem. Perhaps more importantly it marks a new stage in the disciples' awareness of who their friend Jesus really is. "Who do you say that I am?" Jesus asks them. "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God," answers Simon. So far this is just as the event is recorded by Mark and Luke. But in Matthew's gospel there is more. Jesus calls Simon 'Blessed' and reminds him, and us, that this understanding has come to him, and to mankind, only by divine revelation. He then has something more to say to Simon. "You are Peter, and on this rock I will build my Church." The device of changing a name to indicate a change of role or purpose is used in the OT, eg. when Abram is changed to Abraham. (Gen.17:5)

The new names have meaning and ' $\pi\epsilon\tau\rho\sigma\varsigma$ ' which was not used as a name at that time, means 'rock'. Simon is identified as the rock, or foundation, on which Christ's Church is to be founded. (Cf. Matt 7:24) The word used for 'Church' is 'εκκλησια' which means a gathering of people. During its long history the word 'Church' has acquired a meaning, distinctive nuances, of its own. We should be careful of reading these back into Mattthew's time. Lumen Gentium, the Constitution on the Church produced at Vatican II, emphasises that, more than anything else, the Church is the 'People of God'. Jesus is saying to Peter that around him will be gatherered that People; the community of those who accept Jesus as the Messiah, the Son of God. He is also given authority to act in Jesus' name: "Whose sins you shall forgive ... " It is important that we, who belong to God's People, can answer for ourselves Jesus' question, "Who do you say that I am?" It seems to me strange that what follows in the gospel text is deferred until next week. Jesus tells his disciples that he, their Messiah, must be made to suffer and be killed. Peter's recognition of him cannot cope with that apparent contradiction. He does not yet realise the cost of discipleship. There is still a long way to go before he and the other disciples understand that. We, however, have already read the gospel to the very last page.

....from CHRISTUS VIVIT

"Listening calls for three distinct and complementary kinds of sensitivity. The first kind of sensitivity is directed to the individual. It is a matter of listening to someone who is sharing his very self in what he says...The second kind of sensitivity is marked by discernment. It tries to grasp exactly where grace or temptation is present, for sometimes the things that flit across our minds are mere temptations that can distract us from our true path. I need to ask myself what is it that the other person is trying to tell me, what they want me to realize is happening in their lives. Asking such questions helps me appreciate their thinking and the effects it has on their emotions. This kind of listening seeks to discern the salutary promptings of the good Spirit who proposes to us the Lord's truth, but also the traps laid by the evil spirit – his empty works and promises. It takes courage, warmth and tact to help others distinguish the truth from illusions or excuses. (291-3)

PARTICIPATION IN THE LITURGY Now, once again, we are able to celebrate the Eucharist. This is a real cause for rejoicing but we must still be careful to take every precaution against Covid 19.
