22nd SUNDAY YEAR OF ST MATTHEW AUGUST 30th 2020

St Paul makes no bones about it: "The message about the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God." (1 Cor. 1:18) For those who see through the eyes



of faith the cruel and ignominious death on a cross of the one identified by Simon Peter as, "the Messiah, the Son of God," has begun to make sense. For the unaided understanding of human beings in any age it is preposterous. In the gospel today Simon Peter himself is caught up in this conundrum. His concept of the 'Messiah, the Son of God' does not include execution as a common criminal. Such a fate would surely defeat his purpose. And yet Jesus, who accepts Simon Peter's designation of him a few lines earler in the gospel, now tells him, and us, very clearly that he is, "... destined to go to Jerusalem and suffer grievously... to be put to death." When Simon Peter remonstrates with him Jesus calls him 'Satan'.

It is as if Simon Peter's intervention reminds Jesus of Satan's tempting him, at the beginning of the gospel, to choose an easier path. To be a disciple of Jesus, to accept him as the one who 'takes away the sin of the world' is to recognise, along with him, that there is no easier path; the way of salvation is the way of the cross. After his devastating reply to Simon Peter, Jesus goes on to say to all those who want to be his disciples that they must, "Deny themselves, take up their cross, and follow me." We learn from this gospel incident that it took time for Jesus' message to penetrate to the very core even of those whom we call the Apostles. Our own faith has developed at a time when the theology of the cross has been absorbed into our culture over centuries and its familiar symbol is everywhere around us not least in secular jewellery. We have to make an effort to remember what a shocking business the crucifixion really was, and is. The distinction Paul makes between 'those who are being saved' and 'those who are perishing' is very stark and rests on their respective understanding of Jesus' message about the cross as the power of God or foolishness. Jesus says that having suffered and died he will, "...on the third day be raised." Herein lies the power of God. For having risen, Christ will "come in his Father's glory" to be welcomed by those for whom the message of the cross reveals God's power.

"Listening calls for three distinct and complementary kinds of sensitivity...

The third kind of sensitivity is the ability to perceive what is driving the other person. This calls for a deeper kind of listening, one able to discern the direction in which that person truly wants to move. Apart from what they are feeling or thinking right now, and whatever has happened up to this point in their lives, the real issue is what they would like to be. This may demand that they look not to their own superficial wishes and desires, but rather to what is most pleasing to the Lord, to his plans for their life. And that is seen in a deeper inclination of the heart, beyond the surface level of their likes and feelings. This kind of listening seeks to discern their ultimate intention, the intention that definitively decides the meaning of their life. Jesus knows and appreciates this ultimate intention of the heart. He is always there, ready to help each of us to recognize it. We need but say to him: "Lord, save me! Have mercy on me!" (294)
