THIRD SUNDAY of ADVENT YEAR OF ST MARK DECEMBER 13TH, 2020

Today is *Gaudete* Sunday: *gaudete* means 'rejoice'. It takes its name from the antiphon, "Rejoice in the Lord always..." (Philippians 4:4). We rejoice because, as the letter to the Philippians goes on to say, "the Lord



is near." The Cambridge Dictionary defines joy as 'great happiness'. For secular purposes that will do but in the context of today's liturgy it seems insufficient; something is missing. Aware of that, Henri Nouwen says that this joy is, "the experience of knowing that you are unconditionally loved and that nothing – sickness, failure, emotional distress, oppression, war, or even death - can take that love away." That's the joy of being near to the Lord which we celebrate today. We celebrate it as if in the presence of, and in solidarity with John the Baptist. For many people in pursuit of happiness, the John the Baptist does not represent what they are looking for. He rejected most of the pleasures of life as understood by the people of his time. He lived in the desert, rather than the city; he eschewed luxury; he provoked such opposition it led to his

murder. But he was, without a doubt, aware of the love of God. We know this because he was a prophet. A man blessed with exceptional insights in to God, granted him for the benefit of all his creatures. He is often portrayed in icons as having wings. In the same tradition angels, the messengers of God, have wings. Prophets, too, are messengers of God; they hear his Word and speak it to the needy world. Not all prophets are portrayed with wings: only John. He is honoured as the culmination of Old Testament prophecy. The gospels record Jesus saying of him: "This is the one about whom it is written, 'See, I am sending my messenger ahead of you, who will prepare your way before you.' I tell you, among those born of women no one is greater than John..." (Luke 7:27-28) His wings are there because of this and symbolise the power of his prophecy and the importance of his role as the herald of Christ. Today's gospel, part of the prologue to the gospel of John, says of him, "A man came, sent by God. He came as a witness to speak for the light so that everyone might believe through him. He was not the light, only a witness to speak for the light." Those who have listened and believed in the Christ, in every generation down to ourselves, make his prophecy their own and, in Advent, echo it joyfully. An eighteenth century Congregational minister did it rather well: Joy to the world! The Lord is come,

Let earth receive her King! Let every heart prepare Him room And heaven and nature sing. Isaac Watts (1674-1748)
