FOURTH SUNDAY of ADVENT YEAR OF ST MARK DECEMBER 20TH, 2020

The gospel for the fourth Sunday of Advent, so close to the celebration of Christ's birth, is always taken from the infancy narratives. This year it is St Luke's



account of the Annunciation, the starting point of the great mystery of the Incarnation. For those of us who live in the Walsingham Parish this event is constantly before us. The angel, Luke tells us, was sent, "to a town in Galilee called Nazareth." The Shrine of Our Lady in this place is often referred to as 'England's Nazareth'. Living our Christian lives within its ambit we seek, and promote, an affinity with everything Nazarreth represents. It was not a place of any importance and Mary, to whom God;s messenger was sent, was young, not yet married and aptly described as 'lowly'. Even a this early stage in the telling of the good news we are reminded that in the kingdom of heaven, the criteria by which importance is discerned are different from those devised by human beings. Later in the story Jesus teaches us that, "unless you change and become like little children, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven." (Matthew 18:3) The angel greets the lowly maiden as, "so highly favoured," and assures her that

"the Lord is with you". This is the Word of the God being spoken to Mary by his messenger who goes on to tell her, "you will bear a child". This is the creative word of God which says, "Let there be light" and, as a result, "there was light," (Genesis 1:3) Mary has been 'overshadowed' by the power of God; filled with his Holy Spirit. Nothing can resist the power of God's Word. And yet, so far beyond our comprehension is the mind of God, Mary is left free to consent: "Be it done to me as you have said." The nativity, which we celebrate later in the week, is the coming to visible fulfilment of what had already occurred at the time of the annunciation: God made man in Jesus Christ. In human society the moment of birth is of enormous significance. We celebrate birthdays – the feast of the nativity is one off these - and, as anyone who has been in hospital knows, are even identified bu our date of birth. There is, howeverm more tobecoming a human being than being born. The process of incarnation which becgan in Nazareth continued there. In the obscurity of that place Jesus grew to maturity under the care of Mary and her husband Joseph. Luke records that, even as an asdolescent Jesus, "He wnet down with them and came to Nazareth and lived under their authority." (Luke 2:51). That authority, we can be sure, would have embraced the values of God's kingdom. Guided by Mary, who knew that God had 'looked on her lowliness' and 'done great things for her', and by Joseph, who, "did what the angel told him to do" (Matthew 1:24), Jesus the Son of God grew up to become the kind of man he was.
