Prayer of the Church, 2

FOURTEENTH SUNDAY YEAR OF ST MATTHEW JULY 5TH, 2020

The gospel today features two of Jesus' most often quoted teachings. In the first He thanks the Father for revealing 'these things' to mere children whilst



hiding them from the learned and the clever. What things are these? They are the truths about the Kingdom of Heaven and about himself which, at this point in the gospel, Jesus is proclaiming to the towns and villages in Galilee. He had reproached two of these, Chorazin and Bethsiada for their failure to repent - to change the way they lived even after seeing miraculous cures. He refers to those who would not believe his words or his actions as 'the learned and the clever'. They are the worldly wise, people like John Bunyan's Mr Worldly Wiseman from Carnal Town who tries to deflect Christian from his purpose (Pilgrim's Progress, Part 1: 2,3). Those who do accept God's revelation in Christ are called, by contrast, 'mere children'. Like children they are not self-sufficient and know they must rely on their creator to reveal true wisdom (Cf. 1 Cor 2:17-31). Such is the good news of the kingdom which the 'learned and clever' are inclined to reject, thinking they know better. Jesus goes on to offer an invitation everyone. Those who are inclined to accept him, who do not block their ears to the Word of God will likely hear it. "Come to me," he says, "all you who labour and are overburdened and I will give you rest." Are the overburdened those who are made so by the minutiae of Jewish Law? Perhaps. There are others, too, who are burdened by, often unacknowledged, injustices built into their every day lives in a world which belongs to Mr Worldly Wiseman. The invitation is made to all but accepted only by those who 'have ears to hear' (Matthew 11:15). Strangely, the invitation to be given rest is also an invitation to accept 'my yoke'. This burden, however, is light. It involves learning, from Jesus who offers the invitation, the ways of the Kingdom of Heaven and living accordingly. Viewed from the standpoint of Mr Worldly Wiseman this may seem an intolerable burden. But for those who accept Jesus, who believe in him and, "Are given power to become children of God," (John 1:12), mere children to whom 'these things' have been revealed, this burden is light. Its weight is dispelled by the experience of humanity as God intends it, loving and being loved.

"Today, a culture of the ephemeral dominates, but it is an illusion... Today, there are those who say that marriage is out of fashion... In a culture of relativism and the ephemeral, many preach the importance of 'enjoying' the present moment. They say that it is not worth making a lifelong commitment, making a definitive decision... I ask you, instead, to be revolutionaries, I ask you to swim against the tide; yes, I am asking you to rebel against this culture that sees everything as temporary and that ultimately believes you are incapable of responsibility, incapable of true love. I have great confidence in you, and for this very reason, I urge you to opt for marriage. Marriage... involves maturing in your own sexuality, so that it can become less a means of using others, and increasingly a capacity to entrust yourself fully to another person in an exclusive and generous way.
