TWELFTH SUNDAY YEAR OF ST MATTHEW IUNE 21st, 2020

Today we return to 'Sundays in ordinary time'. The wonderful high-spots of the liturgical year have all passed by and we are free simply to reflect on the gospel reading. Jesus says to the twelve, as he sends



them out to proclaim the Kingdom, "Do not be afraid." These words occur quite often in Matthew: an angel uses them to reassure Joseph about Mary's pregnancy at the beginning; Jesus says them to his disciples as he walks toward them on the sea and to Peter, James and John after the transfiguration; and the risen Lord greets the faithful women with them as the story nears its end. On this occasion Jesus is telling, first, the twelve but also those who will come after them that they must be fearless in proclaiming the gospel. The insights they have gained, as it were 'secretly' through their intimate association with him, must be clearly proclaimed.

They will encounter opposition, but they must not be afraid of those who would persecute and kill them. To be afraid is a terrible thing. It paralyses the human spirit faced with a hostile power. Jesus reminds them that their fear can only be conquered by remembering that the power of God is greater than that of those who would kill them and charges then to, "fear him who can destroy body and soul." Many Christians are uncomfortable with the idea of fearing God. Surely, they say, we are not to be fightened of Him? Certainly not. But we must be aware of his power and respect it. The perverted power of those who would persecute us – perverted because it is capable of and perpetrates evil - is a pale imitation of the power of God; it operates only in the sphere of time and cannot create, but only destroy. The creative power of God continues as he keeps in mind all his creation, even things we may consider tobe worth less than ourselves, like humble sparrows. The sparrow is, of course, every bit as much a miracle as we are, but Jesus reassures us that we are worth 'hundreds of sparrows'. If God esteems us so then, clearly, there really is no need to be afraid. We can proclaim the gospel fearlessly, no matter what the opposition, but we must never lose sight of his power: just look at the sparrows.

Young people intensely feel the call to love; they dream of meeting the right person with whom they can form a family and build a life together. This is undoubtedly a vocation which God himself makes known to them through their feelings, desires and dreams. I dwelt more fully on this theme in the Apostolic Exhortation Amoris Laetitia. I would encourage all young people to read especially the fourth and fifth chapters of that Exhortation. I like to think that two Christians who marry have recognized the call of the Lord in their own love story, the vocation to form one flesh and one life from two, male and female. The Sacrament of Holy Matrimony envelops this love in the grace of God; it roots it in God himself. By this gift, and by the certainty of this call, you can go forward with assurance; you have nothing to fear; you can face everything together." (256-257)
