> FEAST OF SAINTS PETER & PAUL YEAR OF ST MATTHEW JUNE 28st, 2020

Simon, to whom Jesus gave the name Peter ('Rocky'), emerges in the gospel as the 'first of the apostles', the one to whom he gave the task of inspiring and



leading the community of his disciples. His importance is emphasised in today's gospel when the risen Jesus asks him, "Do you love me more than these others do?" and, eventually, commissions him to, "Feed my sheep". The fundamental relationship between the disciple and Jesus is one of love. To love someone we must first trust them and, ultimately, value them as much as, or more than, we value our our self. From what we see of Peter as he is portrayed in the gospel, and from the little we know of him afterwards, it is clear that this relationship does not arise instantaneously but develops throughout a lifetime; it requires persistence. Our love of Jesus is 'fed' and develops as we follow the example of Peter within the community of disciples: the Church of Christ. The

story, in Acts, of the healing of a cripple is a dramatic example of Peter feeding the sheep; loving Christ he acts as a conduit for Christ's love, directing the saving power of the risen Jesus to where it is needed.Paul's personality was very different from that of Peter, and so was his experience of Jesus. Like each of us, and unlike Peter, Paul never met Jesus as a physical human being like ourselves. He met the risen Jesus on the road to Damascus where his journey of learning to love him began. He tells the story himself where we read it today in the letter to the Galatians. His encounter with Jesus was, however, no less real than Peter's. His way of living his faith was also different. Paul was an intellectual, a man of deep thought and great learning. He spoke about, and wrote about, Jesus in a way which Peter would never have done. From his writings, which leave us in no doubt about the depth of his love for Christ, grew much of our theological understanding of the mystery of Christ. In an age when intellectual life, apart from its service to the economy, tends to be undervalued I believe we should treasure his ministry. We have inherited their call to bear witness to Christ. We remember too that, ultimately both Peter and Paul demonstrated their love for Jesus by accepting persecution, even unto death, rather than betray their beloved Lord.

#### ....from CHRISTUS VIVIT

"The Synod insisted that "the family continues to be the principal point of reference for young people. *Children appreciate the love and care of their parents, they give importance to family bonds, and they* hope to succeed in forming a family when it is their time. Without doubt, the increase of separation, divorce, second unions and single-parent families can cause great suffering and a crisis of identity in young people. Sometimes they must take on responsibilities that are not proportioned to their age and that force them to become adults before their time. Often, grandparents are a crucial aid in affection and religious education: with their wisdom they are a vital link in the relationship between generations... Don't let yourselves be led astray by those who propose a life of rampant individualism that in the end leads to isolation and the worst sort of loneliness. (262, 263)
