Parish Mass Book, Readings & Prayers 81–83 Prayer of the Church, 2

TRINITY SUNDAY
YEAR OF ST MATTHEW
IUNE 7TH, 2020

The formal doctrine of the Trinity took a long time to mature in the minds and hearts of Christians. Not until the fouth century did we speak of there being, "One God in three persons". Before that time



there was an unshakable belief that God is one, and indivisible. The writings of what became the New Testament, however, notably the Gospel of John, use expressions which seem to indicate that Jesus is divine. "In the beginning was the Word" – and in this gospel the Word is Jesus – " and the Word was with God, and the Word was God." (Jn 1:1). Later Jesus says, of himself, "I and the Father are one..." (Jn 8:30) If there is only one God, how can this be? The early Church Fathers and the councils struggled with the apparent impossibility of this

and struggled also against those who maintained that Jesus was a creature of God and, therefore, subordinate to him. Using the scriptures they argued that somehow, by the power of God which transcends human understanding, he must be God in a way which does not destroy the unity of God. Later they did the same for the Spirit. The point was not to challenge faith with riddles but to allow the disciples of Jesus to live their faith in him by entering into a relationship with God like that which Jesus himself enjoys: loved by the Father, and filled with the Holy Spirit. All this is made possible by the life, death and resurrection of the same Lord Jesus, Word of God made flesh. The feast of the Trinity celebrates the whole of the mystery of salvation from the incarnation to the ascension; it is a celebration of Christian life. We continue this celebration whenever we begin our prayer, "In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit," and end it, "Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever." Artistic representations of the Trinity inevitably fall short of the mystery they seek to portray. The Father, Son and Spirit are always too distinct: there is only one God.

"The life that Jesus gives us is a love story, a life history that wants to blend with ours and sink roots in the soil of our own lives. That life is not salvation up 'in the cloud' and waiting to be downloaded, a new 'app' to be discovered, or a technique of mental self-improvement. Still less is that life a 'tutorial' for finding out the latest news. The salvation that God offers us is an invitation to be part of a love story interwoven with our personal stories; it is alive and wants to be born in our midst so that we can bear fruit just as we are, wherever we are and with everyone all around us. The Lord comes there to sow and to be sown. ... Vocation in the strict sense (is) a call to missionary service to others. The Lord calls us to share in his work of creation and to contribute to the common good by using the gifts we have received. This missionary vocation thus has to do with service. For our life on earth reaches full stature when it becomes an offering. (253-255)
