Prayer of the Church, 1

PENTECOST SUNDAY YEAR OF ST MATTHEW MAY 31ST, 2020

The second chapter of the *Acts of the Apostles* begins: "When Pentecost day came round..." Fifty days from the Day of Resurrection fits nicely with the seven weeks from the Jewish Passover, which determine the Feast of Weeks, which celebrates the



giving of the Torah. On this day the first fruits of the harvest were offered in the Temple as an expression of gratitude for God's providence. On that day, we are told, the Holy Spirit descended on the disciples and filled them with the courage and ability to proclaim the good news, even to the ends of the earth. Traditionally, this is considered to be the beginning of the Church, the community of believers. In the account given in Acts we can learn much of the nature of this community and the role within it of the Spirit Of God. For this, too, we give thanks for God's providence in Christ, the first

fruits of the resurrection and for his Holy Spirit among us. The Gospel of John records this event differently. On the very day of the resurrection, Jesus appears to his disciples who, just as in the story in Acts were afraid, and greets them; "Peace be with you." He 'sends' them; gives them work to do. He tells them this work is the same as that for which the Father sent him. Then he gives them the Holy Spirit to enable them to carry out his commission. He, the Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world, says to his disiples, "whose sins you forgive they are forgiven." The details of the accounts are quite different but the essence is the same: the Spirit of God within the disciples enables them to do what is expected of them. For us, the celebration of the Feast of Pentecost is an opportunity to reflect on the fact that we are what St Paul calls 'Temples of the Holy Spirit'. (1 Cor 3:16; 6:19) The Spirit of God, he tells us, dwells within us. It is all too easy to think of the descent of the Spirit as an event which took place in a different age, portrayed so beautifully by painters like El Greco. It is much harder to see what is portrayed as a symbol of the lived experience of all God's people in every age; to see the Holy Spirit at work, now, in you, me and every disciple of Jesus

"The word "vocation" can be understood in a broad sense as a calling from God, including the call to life, the call to friendship with him, the call to holiness, and so forth. This is helpful, since it situates our whole life in relation to the God who loves us. It makes us realize that nothing is the result of pure chance but that everything in our lives can become a way of responding to the Lord, who has a wonderful plan for us. In the Exhortation Gaudete et Exsultate, I spoke about the vocation of all to grow and mature for the glory of God; I wanted "to repropose the call to holiness in a practical way for our own time, with all its risks, challenges and opportunities". The Second Vatican Council helped us to recognize anew this call addressed to each of us: "All the faithful, whatever their condition or state, are called by the Lord, each in his or her own way, to that perfect holiness by which the Father himself is perfect".
