THIRTY SECOND SUNDAY YEAR OF ST MATTHEW NOVEMBER 8^{TH} , 2020

Several of Jesus' parables begin, "The kingdom of heaven may be compared to..." Today's parable, however, begins, "The kingdom of heaven will be like.."; its future tense prompts us to turn our minds



to the parousia, the second coming of Christ. We know very little about wedding customs in first century Palestine but from this parable we can gather that part of the event took place privately, perhaps contractual arrangements between families, before the wedding feast at the end of the day. The young women in the story seem to be waiting to escort the bridegroom in a torchlight procession towards the banquet. Presumably the girls are keen to participate both in the procesion and in the banquet – especialy the banquet. It is the banquet, the eschatological banquet, that we too, as Christ's disciples, have set our hearts on. It is strange that the last line admonishes us to 'stay awake'. All the girls in the story fell asleep. What distinguishes the wise from the foolish girls is not their wakefulness but their foresight: they had brought along sufficient oil to feed their torches even if, as turned out to be the case, the bridegroom was delayed. We are being encouraged to make adequate provision to meet Christ whenever he might come come again. The story takes us back to an earlier part of the gospel narrative. "It is not anyone who says to me 'Lord, 'Lord' who will enter the kingdom of heaven." (Matthew 7:21-27) There we are told that, "Those who listen to these words of mine and act on them, "are like a sensible man who built his house on rock." The girls who brought enough oil are likewise called sensible. In order to welcome the Kingdom of God, for the coming of which we pray daily, we must listen to and act upon Christ's words, words of him who is the Word of God made flesh. What we must do to welcome Christ when he comes again is the same. If we forget to listen, or forget to act on what we hear then, like the foolsh girls who brought no oil, when we cry out, "Lord, Lord", the dreadful reply: "I do no know you" will ring in our ears. Some say the wise girls could have helped the foolsh ones. If this were just a story of everyday life rather than a parable they might well have done so. But the story is not really about oil. It is about keeping in mind the promise of a parousia, and making provision for it by hearing and keeping the word of God. This is something we all must do for oursleves. We can, of course, develop an environment suffused with God's word where we can sleep the sleep of the just confident that, when we wake up, all will be well.

LOCKDOWN
