Parish Mass Book, Readings & Prayers 140-143 Prayer of the Church, 4

28th SUNDAY YEAR OF ST MATTHEW OCTOBER th, 2020

The gospel reading today ends with the disquieting words, "...many are called, but few are chosen". At the beginning of the Gospel Jesus calls people to be



be his disciples: "Come, follow me." He 'called' them, but it would seem that he did so because he had 'chosen' them to be his disciples. In the centuries since then 'many' people, including ourselves, have heard Jesus' call, his invitation to be his disciple. Have we been chosen? What does it mean to be 'chosen'? The distinction between call and choice is made at ther conclusion of a parable spoken, in the context of Matthew's gospel, to the Chief priest and the people. (21:23-24) They have elders of understood that the two previous parables were an accusation against them and we have been told that 'they would like to have killed him'. (21:45-46) Today's parable is about a king who invites guests to a banquet celebrating his son's wedding. The guests refuse to attend; they have better things to do. When the king repeats his invitation they make it clear that nothing could persuade them to attend

his banquelt. They despise him; they attack and kill his servants. The king realises his chosen guests have turned against him and he destroys them. He then invites anyone and everyone to attend his celebration. It is clear that Jesus considers the chief priest and elders, the leaders of his 'chosen people' to have betrayed his trust. Like the ungrateful people who refused to attend the king's banquet in the parable, they too have opted to pursue their own interests whilst taking advantage of the privileges they enjoyed through his friendship. The call to be a disciple, like any invitation, requires a response: it can be accepted or refused. The kings friends, in the parable, refuse his invitation; the common people accept. The parable, however, is not only about leaders of Israel who have betrayed the trust placed in them. It is about our call to be Jesus' disciples in the kingdom of heaven. The call to be a disciple has costs: "If anyone want to be a follower of mine, let him renounce himself..."(Matt 16:24). This where the poor unfortunate who attends the banquet in the parabel without a wedding garment. It seems, to us, such trivial fault. The reaction of the kings seems to be out of all proportion. Parables often have details which don't quite work, but they contribute, nonetheless, to their general teaching. This ill-clad guest remninds us of the cost of discipleship. He has not counted the cost. Many are called but not all of them, fewer, are grateful to have been chosen and accept the responsibility the invitation entails.

"There are Christians whose lives seem like Lent without Easter. I realize of course that joy is not expressed the same way at all times in life, especially at moments of great difficulty. Joy adapts and changes, but it always endures, even as a flicker of light born of our personal certainty that, when everything is said and done, we are infinitely loved. I understand the grief of people who have to endure great suffering, yet slowly but surely we all have to let the joy of faith slowly revive as a quiet yet firm trust, even amid the greatest distress: 'My soul is bereft of peace; I have forgotten what happiness is... But this I call to mind, and therefore I have hope: the steadfast love of the Lord never ceases, his mercies never come to an end; they are new every morning. Great is your faithfulness...'" (6)
