

The people of our parish

Father Keith

I was born in Kingston Upon Hull on the 13th February 1949. My family was an ordinary Catholic family, Dad was a barber and Mum was a nurse but from memory stayed mainly at home looking after my elder brother and myself.

I went to St. Wilfrid's RC School. I was then educated by the Marist Fathers at the Catholic Boys School, the Marist College. I completed my "A" levels and then went to the Seminary in Milltown, Dublin as a novice. When I finished there, I went to the Marist seminary in Paignton, Devon but this was for only three years as the College then closed. From there it was to Heythrop College, University of London. where I studied for a degree in Theology, this was from 1971-1974. I was ordained in 1973 whilst studying for my degree. It was then decided that I should return to university to study for another degree, this time Sheffield where I studied Politics and Philosophy. I graduated from Sheffield in 1977.

Whilst I was a student, I did some work in the chaplaincy then went to Blackburn in the early 1980s to teach Geography, Economics and of course RE. This was in a Direct Grant Grammar School. The school then became a 6th Form College so I had to go and study for a PGCE at Edgefield College. I then taught sociology to the 6th Formers. From there I went to Middlesbrough in 1985 as Diocesan Youth Officer.

1989 saw my move to Japan. I taught English as a Foreign Language and became a Parish Priest. I spent two years learning the language and was in the Nara Province with a group of Marists responsible for a group of Churches which had been founded by our missionaries. We looked after all the kindergartens churches, and old people's homes in Nara prefecture. As the community aged, this gradually became less sustainable so in 2013, I moved back to the UK and became Parish Priest in Walsingham and, as they say, the rest is History.
